Program Overview

This program provides an in-depth exploration of the roles, responsibilities, and best practices for nominating committees.

Participants will delve into critical topics such as board composition, director independence, succession planning, and managing non-performing directors, while also gaining insights into emerging issues and global trends that influence board effectiveness and governance.

Professor Mak Yuen Teen teaches at the NUS Business School, National University of Singapore, where he founded Singapore's first corporate governance center in 2003 and founded the Centre for Investor Protection in 2024.

He served on three of the four corporate governance committees set up by the Singapore authorities to develop and revise the code of corporate governance and currently serves on the Corporate Governance Advisory Committee under MAS.

Professor Mak has produced a guide for Nominating Committees with KPMG, and served on the advisory panel of the Singapore Institute of Directors which produced the Nominating Committee Guidebook. Between 2000 to 2005, he served on the Governing Council of the Singapore Institute of Directors.

He has written or edited nearly 300 corporate governance case studies and produced numerous reports on corporate governance. He also developed various corporate governance ratings and also the Singapore expert involved in the development of the ASEAN CG Scorecard. Professor Mak has extensive experience conducting training for directors, regulators and other professionals.



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
